ABOUT THE PERFORMERS

Emily Anthony, violinst, maintains an active private studio in Jamestown, teaching students from the Newport and South County areas. She also teaches an after-school violin program at the Jamestown Elementary School. Emily was a founding member of the Amari String Quartet, now in its 25th year as a performing ensemble.

Philip Martorella, pianist, received his musical education at the Mannes College of Music (B.M.), the Juilliard School (M.M.), and the Manhattan School of Music (Music Ed. M.A.). He studied piano with Avraham Sternklar, Nadia Reisenberg, Eugenia Hyman, Sascha Gorodnitzski and Adele Marcus, and piano accompanying studies with Samuel Sanders. Mr. Martorella is currently on the adjunct piano faculty at Rhode Island College, serving as Minister of Music at the First Evangelical Lutheran Church, East Greenwich, RI, and serving as organist at Temple Beth-El, Providence, RI.

Joanne Mouradjian, soprano, has appeared as soloist in the New England area in oratorio, recital and operetta. In 2004 she traveled to Armenia and in 2007 she released her CD, *Songs of the Armenian Soul*. She has performed many lead soprano roles of Gilbert and Sullivan operettas with the Ocean State Light Opera and the Courthouse Light Opera. She sings at Temple Beth-El and is soloist at the First Church of Christ Scientist, both in Providence. In addition to her performing, she is Assistant Professor of Music in Performance at Wheaton College where she teaches voice and Voice Workshop.

Ann Sears, pianist, is Professor of Music at Wheaton and holds degrees from the New England Conservatory of Music, Arizona State University, and The Catholic University of America. She has presented papers and lecture-recitals at national meetings of the Society for American Music, the College Music Society, and the American Matthay Association; her writing appears in *American Music*, the *Journal for Black Music Research*, the *International Dictionary of Black Composers*, the *Cambridge Companion to the Musical*, and *Blackness in Opera*. She appears as pianist on three compact discs of African-American song for Albany Records.

Mo Tian, pianist, has a B.A. from Brown University, an M.M. in piano performance from Indiana University and currently studies with Irma Vallecillo at the University of Connecticut in the Doctoral of Music Arts program in piano performance where he was awarded a full scholarship as well as a graduate teaching assistantship. Prior to his undergraduate studies at Brown University, Mo studied at the Music School of the RI Philharmonic Orchestra in solo piano and chamber music, both of which he finds equally exciting and challenging. Mo is an active member of The Chopin Club of Providence, RI as well as the Hartford Musical Society, both clubs of which have generously supported him through scholarships for his higher music education.

Nana (Lullaby)

Sleep, my child, sleep, sleep, my darling. Sleep, little star of morning. Lullaby, lullaby.

Canción (Song)
